#### WHAT DOES THE CHURCH SAY ABOUT FAMILIES?

#### The Christian church has a number of rules about families:

- 1. Marriage is between a man and a woman
- 2. The purpose of a marriage is to have **Christian children** (No contraceptives)
- 3.No sex before marriage
- 4. Husbands and Wives should treat each other equally

#### The church also supports traditional gender roles:

- 1.Stereotypically men are seen as **the breadwinners** in the family. This means they go to work to earn money for their family. They take less of a role in looking after the home, or caring for children
- On the other hand, women are seen as taking the expressive role in the family. This means that they should complete jobs like cooking, cleaning and childcare
- For many Christians this is seen as the best type of family as it means children are taught the 'correct values' from a young age

### Debates about the family

	Religious believers argue	Atheists argue
Divorce Divorc	Marriage is a commitment made to God, therefore divorce should not be encouraged. Children should be raised in a married family	People should be free to end a relationship if they wish to. Especially in cases of abuse and cheating
Same Sex Marriage	Some believers are against same sex relationships, they believe God made men and women to be together. Others believe God loves all people and wants them be happy and loved	People should be free to love whoever they wish to
Polygamy	Most religions are against polygamy, they believe marriage should be between one man and one woman.  Some religions support polygamy as an important part of their cultural tradition	Most atheists are opposed to polygamy Some atheists support polygamy and argue that religious tradition is preventing people who love multiple people being together
Contraception	Many religions oppose contraception, they argue that if God wants people to have children, it is not our decision to stop him	All atheists support the use of contraception
